During lunch she liked to spend her free time in the cafeteria. "Me and my friends sit there, talk, and finish assignments," mentioned Jamie.




Trace is involved in so many activities that to manage his time, he set aside extra time to do homework and other things. "Give yourself time to get your work done," advised Trace.



To say that junior Laura Brooker is a busy girl is an understatement. Laura keeps very busy going to school, dancing, and working at her grandfather's company.



In ten years Laura hopes to be married with kids and be a neonatal nurse. Perhaps her knowledge of science and her time managing skills will help her achieve this goal.









Ashley has been singing since she was in elementary school, but even the most talented performers need to practice. "I sang through the song two or three times a night," replied Ashley.


"I have always been in choir, but this year I have been brave enough to be in the talent show," remarked Ashley.

To anyone who might be worried about what people might think of you, or just don't think you are good enough, Ashley said, "Don't be nervous about it. Practice and be confident."









Croussore said, "I'm just dang good at art, guitar, and in all I do."


Croussore didn't claim to be big on school, and questioned why students in perfect health should take a health course. He found many things he did like about MGHS, like faculty, although for different reasons.

"My favorite teacher is Mr. Badger because his last name is a small furry rodent," claimed Croussore.


"Aaron Croussore is daring, inventive, and self-assured. Only a real man can wear pink," commented English teacher Mrs. Hull.

This writer would like to end by giving the world some advice, "Watch out."



She not only works hard at school on her work, she also has a job. "I work at Arby's. I work about eight hours a week," she commented.



"My greatest accomplishment is becoming a Christian. It's a good feeling to know that you're going to heaven," said Tomlin.





In ten years, Aaron sees himself as married, working as an engineer or playing baseball, making six-figures a year. He claims everything after that is up to his wife.






Concentration fills the face of freshman Nick Chapel as he attempts to finish his 7th period wood shop project.



Like father, like son. This is a common statement to many families; to professional athletes as well as to high school athletes, and maybe even to freshman Shawn Wedmore and his father.



When asked what she disliked about school, she only mentioned the lack of support and fake affection some teachers show toward students.


With a hearing problem conquered, her next goal is to make the honor roll.

Mia's determination and courage rubbed off in other aspects of her life. She is happy to be herself and does not care what others think of her. That itself takes a tremendous amount of courage.








Mr. Strasemeier chose to be a teacher because he wanted to be a coach. Strasemeier coached youth leagues when he was in high school.





















"It's for the best academic student on the team. I just got good grades my first three years. I felt really honored. I really wasn't expecting it," said Joe.





Miller Joins 1,000 Point Club



With his high school career behind him, Miller plans to attend college nearby, so that his parents and fans can come to watch.

























Art Show and Showstoppers Spectacular




Showstoppers entertain once again. Besides this May spectacular, Showstoppers put on many performances throughout the year, such as appearing at the Paramount Theater.
