
Me About It!




to Increase Pep

















They organized committees to take care of handling the theme, decorations, and also refreshments. Juniors not involved in the steering committee had the opportunity to get involved in prom planning through different committees.





















Other awards given to players for the 1989 season were outstanding passer,




Although the 1989 volleyball season had some negative moments and tough matches, the returning players will have the desire to improve upon their skills








The girls' tennis team had a losing season, ending with a 0-9 record for the varsity and 3-4-1 for the junior varsity.







last year, Elwood fell to Tipton 17-7 and was handed their first defeat of the season. This loss was the first conference game Elwood had lost in the last two years.






The coaches expect a bright future. They will have ten of the top twelve back next year. There is also a good



When Coach Craun was asked what




























gram, variety show, and commencement.


The Panther guard consisted of ten members and was instructed by a new teacher, Mrs. Leann Short. She helped the guard with their routines for parades and marching contests.



tion on February 24, 1990, here at Elwood.








not allowed to drive.


Build Our Future


come more involved in school activities.




Freshman Bob Goins works deligently on the PSAT test.



Economics

Future Homemakers of America and the home economics classes offer many learning opportunities. Home economics is not only the traditional foods/nutrition and clothing/textiles classes but also classes that teach skills to help cope with the responsibilities of the home and family.

The foods/nutrition classes enable the students to understand the daily food requirements and to plan, purchase, prepare, and serve complete meals as well as individual dishes.

The clothing/textiles classes are designed to stress the importance of wise selection and the care of clothing. Laboratory time is used to study fibers and fabrics. This year students conducted various tests on fabrics to study and identify their characteristics. A fashion show was held on May 3, 1990, showing the clothes that the students made for themselves.

The consumer education class is a class to help students learn skills to help them as individual consumers. A general overview of economics is used to introduce the course, followed by steps of decision making and problem solving.


The interpersonal relations class is designed to aid students in gaining an insight into the thoughts and actions of others. Main topics of this course

are developing a positive self-image and coping with and reducing stress.

Child development deals with prenatal care and child care. Basic skills taught deal with safety, discipline, home nursing, and planning a play school for three-four year olds.

The family relations class is a course to prepare students for the challenges and joys of family life. Dating and marriage are also studied.

Independent living is aimed at preparing for college or single living. Skills and concepts learned in this class can be used in almost any lifestyle situation.



TPC and Printing Students

Prepare for a Career

The printing class at the John H. Hinds Area Vocational School, taught by Mr. Fortner, helps students to develop a wide variety of skills. The students learn to create art for advertising, improve their typing skills, and learn desktop publishing. They also take pictures, develop film, and develop their own prints. They print T-shirts and work with the offset press.

There are seven basic areas of study in the printing class. They include image design, image composition, image conversion, image carriers, image transfer, finishing, and economics. All printing students must show a minimum standard of achievement in each of the seven areas of study.

All printing students are members of the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) which is a national organization that allows students to compete in leadership and trade skills contests at the local, state, and national levels.

The Information Processing Center (IPC) allows students to develop busines skills and knowledge. It is a three hour class taught by **Mrs. Poole**. The class offers individualized instruction in such subjects as business computer applications, typing, filing, letter writ-

ing, telephone techniques, communications, and focuses on the career objectives of each student. Two hours each day are spent on work station rotations. Students may work as an office manager, receptionist, payroll clerk, inventory clerk, word processing operator, or various types of secretaries depending on their career objectives.

All students in the IPC class are members of the Business Professionals of America (BPA). They compete in district, state, and national level contests to develop professionalism.



Vocational Engineering

A Cut Above The Rest

Building trades and machine trades are both vocational classes offered by John H. Hinds Area Vocational School. The building trades class prepares students in the construction trades in carpentry, masonary, drywall, bricklaying, electrical wiring, plumbing, painting, and heating and ventilating. On-the-job experience is provided through the construction of a residential home or garage that is sold to defray cost and provide funds to begin another project house or garage. The class receives its jobs by advertising in the paper and by word of mouth. The class has a strong reputation for doing excellent work. Each project

takes at least one year to a year and a half. All training of the students takes place as the project is being built. The students do all the jobs related to the house, and only the heating is contracted to another firm. The building trades class offers a morning and an afternoon class, each three hours long.

The machine trades technology students learn the machining and processing of metals on actual industrial machines. Classes include instruction concerning drill press work, lathe metal cutting saws, grinding, electrical discharge machines, and numerical control as well as shaper and milling operations. The students have a wide variety of projects to choose from. Some of

these include cannons, vices, angle plates, hammers, punches, and surface gauges. The class had 46 students including both morning and afternoon classes. Of these students, many are from neighboring schools. Tipton, Frankton, Alexandria, Madison Grant, Tri-Central, Hamilton Heights, Clinton Central, and Kokomo each have students involved in the machine trades course.


