


















followed by the singing of the choir.








Journalism


September 19, 1996, the students took a field trip to Anderson University for Department Visit Days to learn about the communications department.

Through hard work and dedication, Journalism experienced what it was like to work in the journalism field.









Between having fun and goofing off, the band had two performances, one for Christmas and one in the Spring.


The band practiced each day in class, improving their skills for high school band. One of their favorite songs for the year was "Eagle Mountain Overture."

In Physical Science the students studied Atoms and how they were put together.


Social Studies



Media Club






Every member of the sophomore class is required to take one semester of Health 10.


The boys and girls cross country teams both had productive seasons this year. The teams were coached by Tom Champion.








Pete Hobbs (10) powerfully tears down a rebound and the Eagles head down the court to shoot for two more..

This year's season was one that will be remembered for quite some time. The team consisted of four seniors, three sophomores, and four freshmen.




Cheerleading
















"Cheerleading was a lot of fun. The Varsity cheerleaders helped a lot, and Becky Harrison was a great coach," said Jilayne Wilhoite.








Of course we all know that we attend Frankton Junior /Senior High School. We have a little school. But we like our school, right? Good. We think most students feel the same way.






