




We, the Senior class of nineteen-hundred and forty-eight, dedicate this book to the Summitville High School.





CLASS HISTORY

In September, the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-six our twelve page adventure began as forty-two bare-faced children entered good old S. H. S. for the first time. When Miss Dolly greeted us with her friendly smile our fright was permanently removed. By the end of our first year we had forty-four students because even though three pupils left, five others made their timid appearance.

With great self-assurance we entered Miss Wolf's second grade. Four small children among whom was Betty Redman joined us while three pupils left.

Finding ourselves confronted by Miss Achsah in our third year, we learned the meaning of work. That year five new youngsters among whom were John Marley, Wanda Coty and Bill Tomlinson, came in but three others left. This made 49 pupils completing the third page of history.

Our fourth year of sweat rendering toil was under the guiding hand of Miss Gooding. Beginning with forty-six we lost two pupils but soon Gene Dickerson and Ruth Webb filled their places.

Mr. Zimmerman, our first male teacher, accepted the task of shepherding the flock of forty-one pupils through our fifth page of history.

To our delight, Mr. Ingram took the job as sixth grade teacher. The class was gradually diminishing, as it advanced. To our thirty-nine beginners we added Olene Garrett, Don Massie and Joyce Renfro, but lost four other members.

Mr. Gossett took over the seventh grade and taught us the meaning of studying.

That year we had our first class organization with Rex Kilgore president and Miss Sharp sponsor. A few of our boys played on the "Spooks" team which marked the first step to athletic achievement. During the year we lost five pupils, so thirty-four students completed the seventh page of history.

Came the eighth year we elected Mr. Gossett sponsor with Billy Harris president. We had an excellent Spooks team this year, also. Though we lost three, thirty-three students proudly received their diplomas.

On a sunny day in September 1944, we again entered school. This time as "Green Freshies." We had no idea whether to put our books in the assembly or in the boiler room. We soon found out. This year Norma Chapel, Don Flynn, Carolyn Fennimore, Forrestine Full, Mary Hamilton, Martha Thurston, and Peggy Hall came into the class from Boone Township.

This year we elected Billy Harris president with Mrs. Bales sponsor. We had a difficult time paying dues and making money.

In 1945-46 Miss Gilliatt led us successfully through our tenth page of history with Billy Harris again as president. Two pupils left while three more arrived among whom was Jacqueline Cunningham and Gene Dickerson.

Thirty-five students as Juniors elected Mr. Moomaw sponsor and John Marley president. During the year the class was increased by Bernard Lallathin and Bertha Epperly, but we lost Betty Byrnes, Norma Chapel, Joe Lindsey, and Billy Harris.


We are proud of our boys who are athletes. They played excellent basketball with Johnny Carpenter, captain, and won the county trophy in baseball for 1947-48.

During the senior year we re-elected Mr. Moomaw sponsor and John Marley president. We still have with us thirteen students who attended all twelve years here at S. H. S. We are now looking forward to that which will climax our long struggle, the reception, our trip to Washington, and our diplomas.



Betty Redman Zell announces she is now grey-haired worrying over the health of her war correspondent husband.


Goodness, Nancy Saunders is a saleslady in L. S. Ayres' store at Indianapolis.

WILLIE'S WEEK-END





Y-TEENS
