
































































KEEPING STRIDE



















































TESTING WEEK

During the week of September 15 all sophomores were required to take the ISTEP+ exam, a graduation qualifying exam which all students are required to pass to graduate. Students who had not passed the exam in past years repeated the sections of the test that they had previously failed. The students were tested in three areas of study, math, English, and grammar in answer formats including short answer, multiple choice, and essay. The tests were taken in the morning, followed by a shortened school schedule. While the

freshmen and sophomores were testing during the morning of each day, the juniors and seniors who had passed the ISTEP+ test, either one or two years before, were able to participate in entertaining, yet educational activities and games. Activities provided for the juniors and seniors included a field trip to Reardon Auditorium at Anderson University, a self-defense course, drug dog demonstrations by the Alexandria Police Department, and several open question and answer sessions with police officers. Students were able to ask the officers questions concerning gangs, drugs, school security, and other topics in law enforcement that affected them. The senior class held their annual picnic at Calloway Park. The seniors were able to reminisce about their high school careers while they ate a potluck lunch. They were also able to enjoy a morning of fun while playing on the slides, swings, and jungle gyms.






INVOLVED

The school-to-work program directed by Mrs. Mindy Parker, helps students connect school-based learning with work-based learning in order to apply it to a career field. Mrs. Parker had two full days of regional training in Muncie and attends approximately four meetings a year to keep updated on the program. The School-To-Work Opportunities Act (STWOA) is a federal act passed by Congress in May 1994. It is financed by a federal

grant that is given to the states to distribute to different regions. This program has been a part of Elwood High School for 3 years. Many businesses such as Red Gold, Red Giant, St. Vincent's Mercy Hospital, the police and fire departments, and many city departments participate in this co-op program. The students who participate in internships must qualify by application, acquire two teacher recommendations, have approval for attendance and discipline, and have parental permission to drive to the location. The students are asked to keep a log of their hours and activities while businesses are asked to do an evaluation at the end of every grading period. Mrs. Parker also coordinates field trips for careers, guest speakers, and job shadow situations.





The John H. Hinds Career Center offers a multitude of opportunities. The career center has been a part of Elwood since 1968. The center was named after John H. Hinds who was a teacher in the Elwood Community School Corporation for 42 years. Schools from the surrounding areas such as Frankton, Alexandria, Madison Grant, Tipton, Hamilton Heights, and Tri-Central also send students to the JHH career center. Any

junior or senior interested may apply for enrollment. The students must make application and have their school guidance counselor's approval. The students may enroll in one of the many classes including machine trades, building trades, printing technology, auto body, auto mechanics, welding, marketing, health occupations, and IPS. The career center also has clubs and organizations such as student council, VICA, and committees within each class to plan additional events. The center also allows students to interact with other students from different schools. 


LEARNING











EgyptAir Flight 990 crashes into the Atlantic Ocean on October 31, killing all 217 people on board. Although suspicious actions of a pilot are under scrutiny by American and Egyptian officials, the cause of the crash remains a mystery.

On October 12, the world's official population hits 6 billion. The designated 6 billionth human is a baby boy born in Sarajevo.

Parents, with help from their doctor, select the gender of their baby using a technique called MicroSort, which separates X-bearing (female-determining) and Y-bearing (male-determining) sperm. The success rate is about 92 percent for females and 69 percent for males.
