



WE saw drama in the first TV airing of the all time great film, *Gone With The Wind*.


EVEN though we spend one third of a day living the semi-sheltered lives of M-G students, we don't ignore what goes on outside our world.

The senior who scored the highest on a written exam concerning homemaking was awarded the Leadership of Tomorrow Award.










EVERY year there are a few things that make that year special in one way or another. These pages tell of some things that made 1976-77 a year like no other.








Academics

SPANISH, French, Speech and English comprise the Language Arts Department.


Introductory Grammar, the only new class this year in the Language Arts Department, provided the needed link between Basic Grammar, and Advanced Grammar.



Several outsiders were guest speakers in the English Department this year. A basketball official, a mortician, an alcoholic, and a probation officer were some who spoke to various English classes.



A new teacher was added in this department, Miss Ferree, who teaches General Math and Algebra.



Advanced chemistry students had projects and notebooks due at the end of every nine weeks. Students spent more time in lab doing experiments than in regular chemistry.











SPECIAL Education is a new program this year. The main objective is to prepare students to reach their fullest potential in this expanding, highly technological society.


Pre-Vocational Education is a new course in this area. This course teaches students to strive for personal and academic competition for obtaining and maintaining a job.

Remedial Reading students learn how to solve word attack and comprehension skill problems plus develop a liking for reading. They study units on banking, jobs, driver's tests, and interviews.


The Freshmen Core program is a combination of Speech, English, and Reading. It offers students total communication, both verbal and nonverbal.

FIFTY-TWO enthusiastic and interested students are enrolled in Marion and Elwood's Vocational Schools this year.

Tucker Area Career Center (Marion), offered such courses as Drafting, Graphic Arts, Construction Trade, and Health Occupations. Twenty-three students enrolled in afternoon classes, while twelve chose morning classes.

Auto Body, Auto Mechanics, and Electronics topped the list of courses at the Mid-Central Vocational School (Elwood). Only seventeen students attended classes in Elwood, ten in the afternoon and seven in the morning.

Enrollment has increased in both vocational schools this year, up from the thirty-four of last year. Three credits are achieved for classroom participation.





ADVANCED Bookkeeping and Business Principles were added this year to the Business Department.



























try, try again



Managing is a growing sport


MANAGING has almost become a sport all by itself at Madison-Grant. More and more students are getting involved in athletics without participating in actual competition.











This is the highest finish any M-G football team has had since joining the conference.

Captains, Brad Buroker, offensive halfback, and Tony Scott, defensive linebacker, along with Tony Skinner, offensive tackle, were selected to the all-conference team.

This season proved to be one of the better ones the team has had, losing four games by only one touchdown.









Young gridders disappointed


When the B-team won, they won big, scoring an average of 28 points per victory.








