



Accelerated Reader






While working on his comparative essay, senior Tyler Croaff gets help from his favorite teacher, Mrs. Herring, in Academic English 12.

Facing *Graduation*




Facing *U.S. History*


Facing *ISTEP+* Testing


Facing Sleepers










When one walks the halls of M-G two faces can be found. One would be the face of concentration, like the one on senior Zac Ray's face, as he sits through class.

e n d u r i n g FREEDOM

Tuesday, September 11, 2001, will be remembered as a tragic day that changed the world. That morning, a plot, masterminded by terrorist Osama bin Laden and the al-Qaeda network, was put into action. 


















