

Willkie Day 1990 was the 50th anniversary of the return of Wendell L. Willkie to his hometown to accept the Republican nomination for President of the United States. A re-enactment ceremony was held in front of the arch at the Elwood Community School auditori-

um at 2:00 p.m., Saturday, August 18 where Elwood native Jared Carter delivered Willkie's presidential nomination acceptance speech originally given in 1940. State Representative Dick Delinger served as the master of ceremonies, and music was provided by

the Elwood Community High School band.

The dedication of a historical marker placed at the entrance to Callaway Park followed the ceremony. The marker was placed at the location where Willkie delivered the second of his two speeches in 1940.


yards and five touchdowns. Also **Bill Shallenberger** and **John Wilson** had one touchdown apiece.




ump It Up








message."








To raise funds for the cost of the books, the staff held a


dance, sold advertising and senior ads, and sponsored its annual yearbook sale, selling over 400 books.

The *Megaphone* staff sold ads to local businesses to raise


funds.

plans to come back to attend UCLA or DePauw University. In the future she would like to work in international business.



The projects are designed to educate students as well as to add some variety to the classroom situation. Much learning takes place from actually doing.



























Finding a career

The auto body and welding technology programs are two year programs for high school and post-secondary people who are interested in learning the trade. Students enrolled in these classes come from Elwood as well as neighboring schools. **Mr. Phillip Kidwell** teaches auto body, and **Mr. Kenneth Harris** teaches welding. These programs were developed to meet the needs of industry and prepare trainees to fill these occupations. Concepts that are used in industry

are also the concepts that are taught in the program. The purpose of these courses is to prepare the students to become productive and useful citizens in their respective communities. Upon completion of the full course the student should have entry level skills to enter the trade or apprenticeship programs of auto body or welding. All students become members of Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) as a part of their leadership training, social, and competitive

outcome. Local banquets are held, and services are performed as well as student participation in state, regional, and national VICA contests. We are proud to have had many winners in the state competitions. This year Elwood Community High School had two students as VICA state officers, **Mark Thornberry** as vice-president and **J.R. Reese** as state reporter. They worked very hard planning VICA activities.





What started as a class project for Mr. Bomholt's economics class ended in a donation to the national debt and coverage on Channel 6 News. For the first time the economics class, assisted by consultant Mark Ellison, formed a student company. The class elected officers and then performed market surveys to select a product to sell. The class chose squeeze bottles, and they then ordered the bottles from the Pride Company of Bloomfield, Michigan. The company, 3 B Enterprises, sold 195 bottles at \$4.00 each, netting a profit of \$63.42 after taxes, salaries, and commissions were subtracted. It was then that one student, Gina Deavers, suggested that

the class donate the money to the national debt. A representative from Dan Burton's office, John Price, was contacted, and he, along with Angela Cain of Channel 6, Fran Hoffman of the *Elwood Call Leader*, and a reporter from the *Anderson Herald*, arrived at the school on October 19 to accept the donation to the government and to cover the event. On October 18 Dan Burton made the following entry into the Congressional Record.

Mr. Burton of Indiana, "Mr. Speaker, the majority of the American people want the budget problem solved, and they want it solved now. I believe that the people want this problem solved in such a way

that they won't have to pay a great deal of additional taxes. I believe that they want to see a solution that focuses on spending cuts instead of tax increases on an already overburdened populace.

Mr. Speaker, I have here a letter from the students of Elwood Community High School that demonstrates the concern that the people of the Sixth District of Indiana have about this problem. I think the students of Elwood High School express very well, not only the sentiments of the people of the Sixth District, but the sentiments of all Americans. These students and their teachers should be commended."






With a Cause









The junior varsity football team dropped its record to 1-3 as they fell to the hands of the Frankton Eagles who upped their record to 5-2.


















For the Class of 1991 it hasn't been the easiest of senior years. We learned that death does not spare the young, that flowers can be for proms and funerals, and that great pain is a reality of life.

Ronna Lawson was my first cousin and my best friend, and the class has left her place in the procession and her chair empty. And now its time to fill in that empty place. Remembering Ronna and dealing with her early and tragic death may well be one of the first steps toward adult status for the Class of 1991.

We have all learned from Ronna's death. Ronna had told me that she was thinking about suicide, but I just didn't think that she would actually do it. Now we all know that a person who talks about suicide is crying for help. If a friend or family member ever needs someone to talk to, be there for them. Listen and take everything that they say seriously.

We can't change the past and bring Ronna back, but we can honor her memory by being kind to each other. We can reach out and help where there is pain. If Ronna's memory causes another human being to be helped, then the world will be a little better place.

The day before she died, Ronna asked me to pray for her. It's always hard to look into the past and not think of "maybes" and "what-if's." With Ronna, I think of the saying, "Some people come into your life and quietly go. Some stay awhile and leave footprints in our hearts, and we are never the same." Ronna left footprints in the hearts of all who knew her.

Ronna will remain behind unless we take her with us in memory. Use what we have learned to be supportive of our friends and to recognize and help the pain in others. Think of our classmate as a teacher of a very expensive lesson and love and forgive each other. Remember Ronna with kindness and forgiveness and go into our future with peaceful hearts.




