


## Homecoming Highlights

Later in the evening several students celebrated Halloween by dressing up in costumes and trick-or-treating. Collecting treats during the night are Scott Richardson and Holly Cline.






## Friends Forever

# CHANGE OF PACE


Several of the teachers at ECHS had not planned on being teachers. They said they would rather be doing various activities.



Health teacher Ms. Johnson would rather spend all of her time playing the lottery, hoping to hit the jackpot.



Mrs. Merritt would rather be a travel agent or perhaps own her own travel agency. She would also enjoy traveling anywhere.








*in Academics*



*adores new computers*








### An environmental cause

"L-102 allowed me to read more literature by the great authors." - Madonna Hahn






For the first time in 30 years Elwood Community High School hosted the Madison County Choral Festival. It was held on March 19.

The freshman honors class taught by **Raeanna Merritt**, studied the history of industrialization in a unit called the "Major Components of Industrialization." ELSA differs from the U.S. factories in a few ways. All the people wear the same uniforms while working, and all the people are treated equally.


The honors class used the information that they learned along with photographs taken during the tour of ELSA to compose a photo essay. The photo essay was completed in May and shared with the ELSA employees.






An ELSA worker is welding together parts that are used to make mufflers for their cars.

The press machine, which is totally computerized and repairs itself, presses out the metal to make the parts. The machine is as big below the surface as it is above the surface.












During her 24 years of employment Mrs. June Van Wagner has served as the guidance director, cheerleader sponsor, and freshman volleyball coach. She also instituted girls' basketball, volleyball, and track in the 1970's.

Mrs. VanWagner's creative attitude is expressed every year at the final home boys' basketball game. She writes a special poem for each senior team member, cheerleader, or manager which everyone enjoys greatly and demonstrates her dedication to students.

A determined, strong-willed, and hopeful attitude was an important key in Mrs. Darren Paquin's victory over a failing heart. In 1985 Mrs. Paquin contracted a virus that attacked her heart and caused damage to her heart. Doctors told her that she had six weeks to a year to live. She conquered the odds by surviving the deterioration. Then in 1989 she suffered sudden cardiac death while in her yearbook class. Mr. Huffman, Mr. Pantos, and Mr. Paquin performed CPR until the paramedics arrived. Doctors implanted a difibrillator which regulated the heartbeat, actually shocking her with electricity if it stopped or exceeded 175 beats per minute.

The defibrillator restarted her heart three times before she received a heart transplant on January 22, 1992. Mrs. Paquin had been on a waiting list since August 1991. Once again she survived the odds and regained her strength quickly after the transplant. She will return to her classes in the fall of 92.









The boys' tennis team finished with a very successful season going 11-7 and winning the Western Boone tournament and the Central Indiana Conference.








Tackling was dominated by senior Jason Springer. He had 89 unassisted tackles, and Scott Decker had 80 unassisted tackles.















The 1992 boys' swim team finished with a record of three wins and four losses, but they broke several of their own records throughout the year making it a successful season.













