#### Republicans dominate mock elections

Since 1980 was a presidential election year, an all-school mock election was held by the Social Studies Department. In this election, students registered and voted just as is done in the real elections; they voted as the country did by electing Republican candidates.

For president, Ronald Reagan received 164 of the 265 votes cast. For senator, Dan Quayle received 169 votes to Birch Bayh's 84. For U.S. Representative, Elwood Hillis received 182 votes to Nels Ackerson's 74. For Governor, Bob Orr received 180 votes to John Hillenbrand's 77.

The contract grading system was used in some history classes this year. This system, which involved doing posters, book reports, bulletin boards and other projects, required extra effort from the student to receive an "A".

### New computer aids students

In Agriculture Economics, students used a computer that was new to the department this year. This computer aided students as they learned how to manage a farm on paper.

The Agriculture Department, which is supported by the farming of the 17.35 acre farm plot next to the school, managed to offer a variety of classes. Classes such as Soils and Crops taught students about the variety of seeds available and which ones should be planted where. Ag Construction and Ag Mechanics included learning skills such as brick laying, electrical wiring, repairing and using farm equipment and many other skills necessary on a farm.

The Agriculture Department had to keep changing in order to help students keep up with the constant changes new technology is bringing to the farms of America.

#### Students learn vocational skills

The Industrial Arts Department taught blue-collar skills to students. Introduction to Industrial Arts familiarized students with the basics. Students worked on various wood projects in Basic and Advanced Woods classes. Small-scale frame buildings were made in Light Construction. General welding skills were taught in welding classes.

Fifty-seven Madison-Grant students took advantage of classes offered through vocational classes at Tucker Area Vocational School at Marion and Hinds Area Vocational School at Elwood. These classes enabled students to extend their education and gain skills in a specific area.

Some of the classes were Machine Trades, Electronics, Graphic Arts, Construction Trades, Auto Mechanics, Welding, and Auto Body in the industrial area. Other classes and work/study programs were offered in the business area.
