A Good Knowledge of Math and Science




Science proves an interesting subject to these eighth grade students as they learn the fundamentals under the direction of Mrs. Goodman.

These Sophomores firmly believe in the old adage, "The way to a man's heart is through his stomach." Homemaking classes study all phases of cooking.




















