Madison-Grant High School is more distinctive than many other schools in the area. For starters, we are the only high school in the United States to have an Argyll as a mascot, but more importantly, we stand out academically. We were one of only 2 schools in Grant county to earn an "A" rating from the state for the 2016-2017 school year. While the state of Indiana's graduation rate is 87.2%, Madison-Grant's graduation rate is one of the highest in the state at 97.7%.

Since Madison-Grant is a fairly small school, we are a close community. Students, faculty, and staff consistently work together to make Madison-Grant and our community as a whole a better place to be. During ISTEP testing, non-testing students left the comforts of campus and went to Fairmount and Summitville to clean up the neighborhoods after the long winter. We also do a lot of fundraisers to benefit various organizations dedicated to helping those in our community, including the annual NHS Christmas auction, the Spanish Club trunk-or-treat for UNICEF, multiple can food drives benefiting Helping Hands, ugly sweater contests and pajama days for childhood cancer awareness, and many other events,

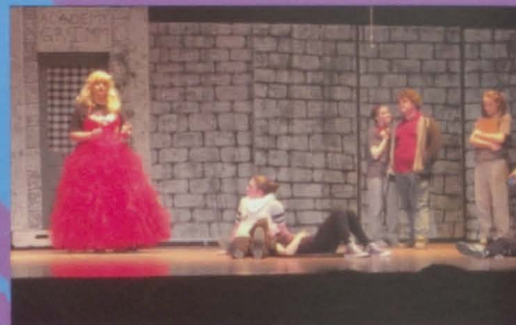

This year was the first time in 4 years that Madison-Grant had a drama club. 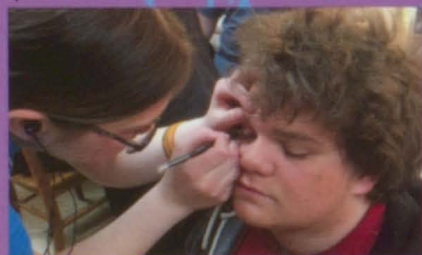

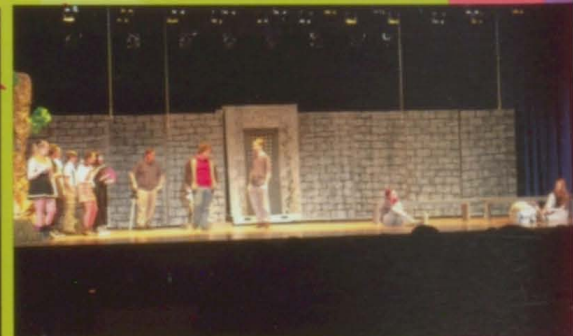
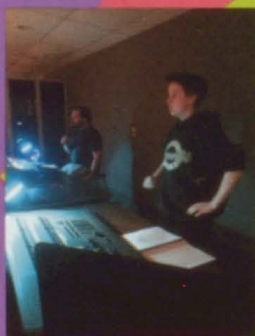

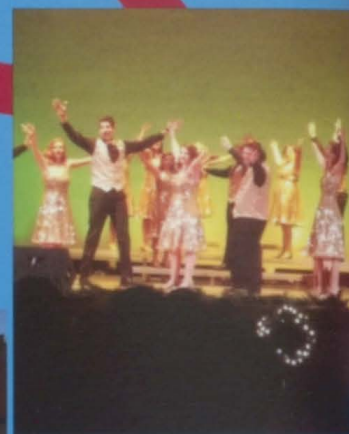

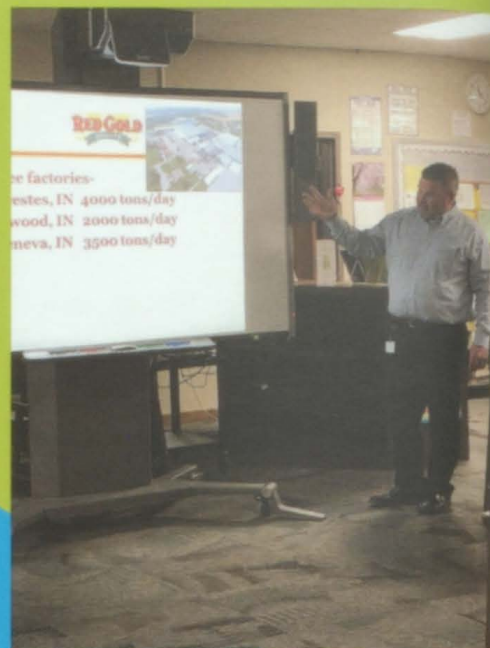

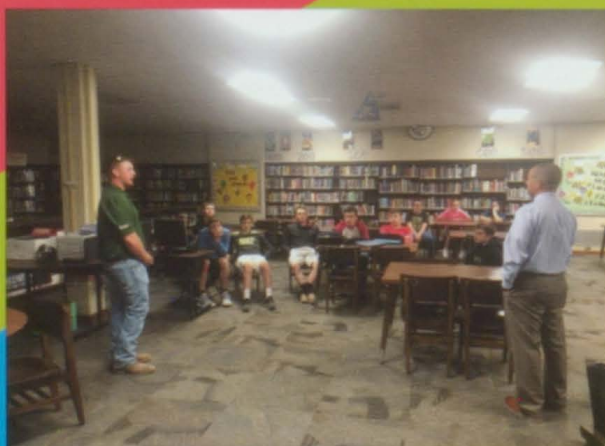

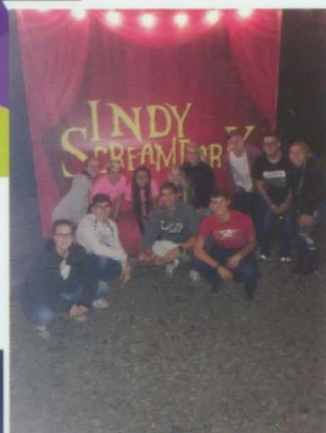

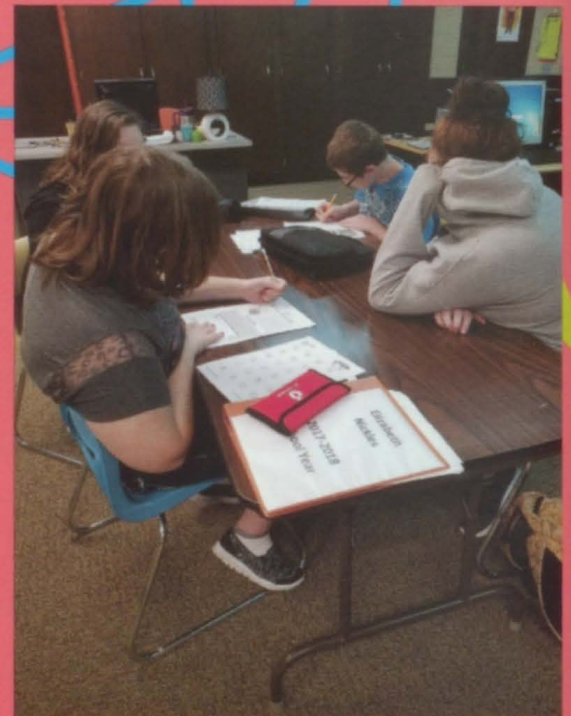

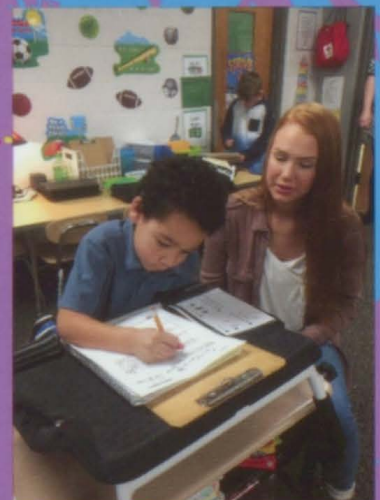

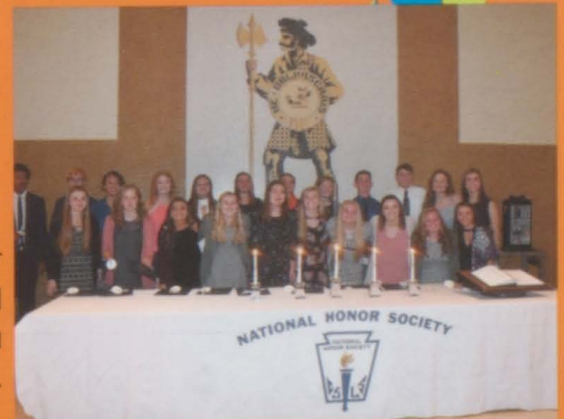

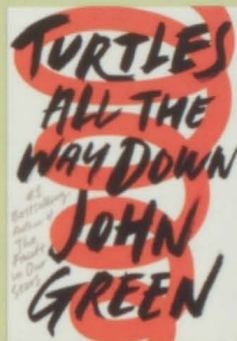

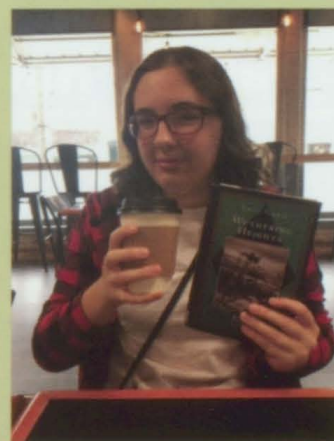

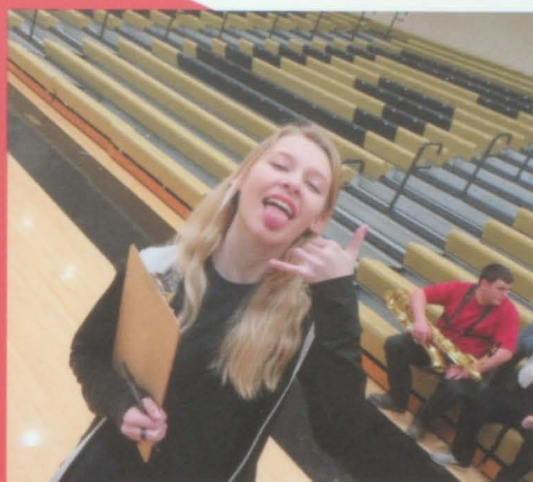

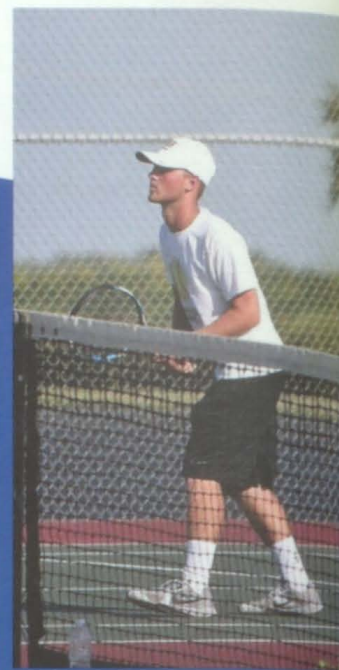

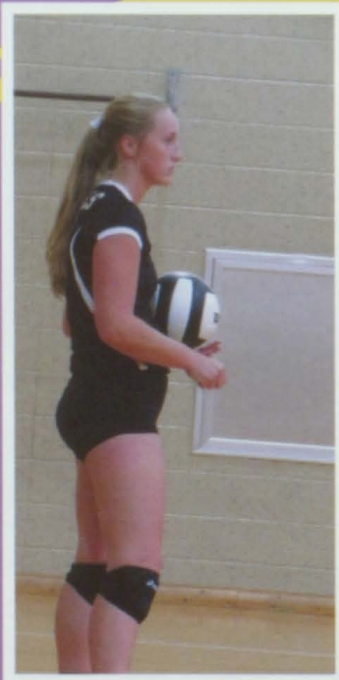

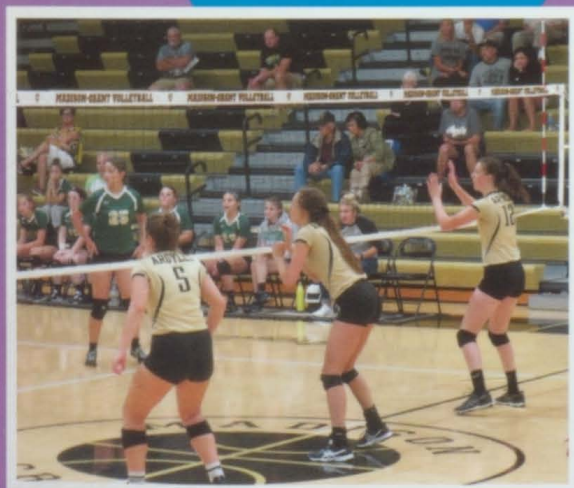

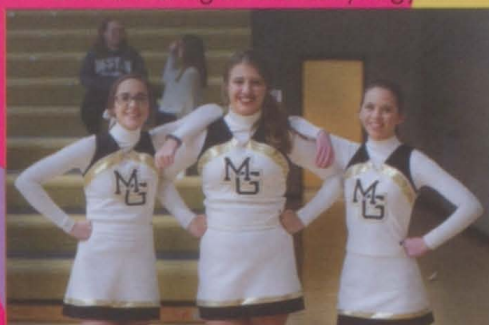

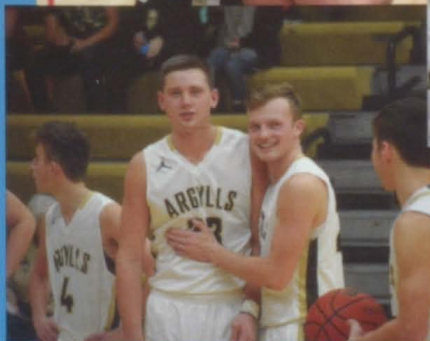

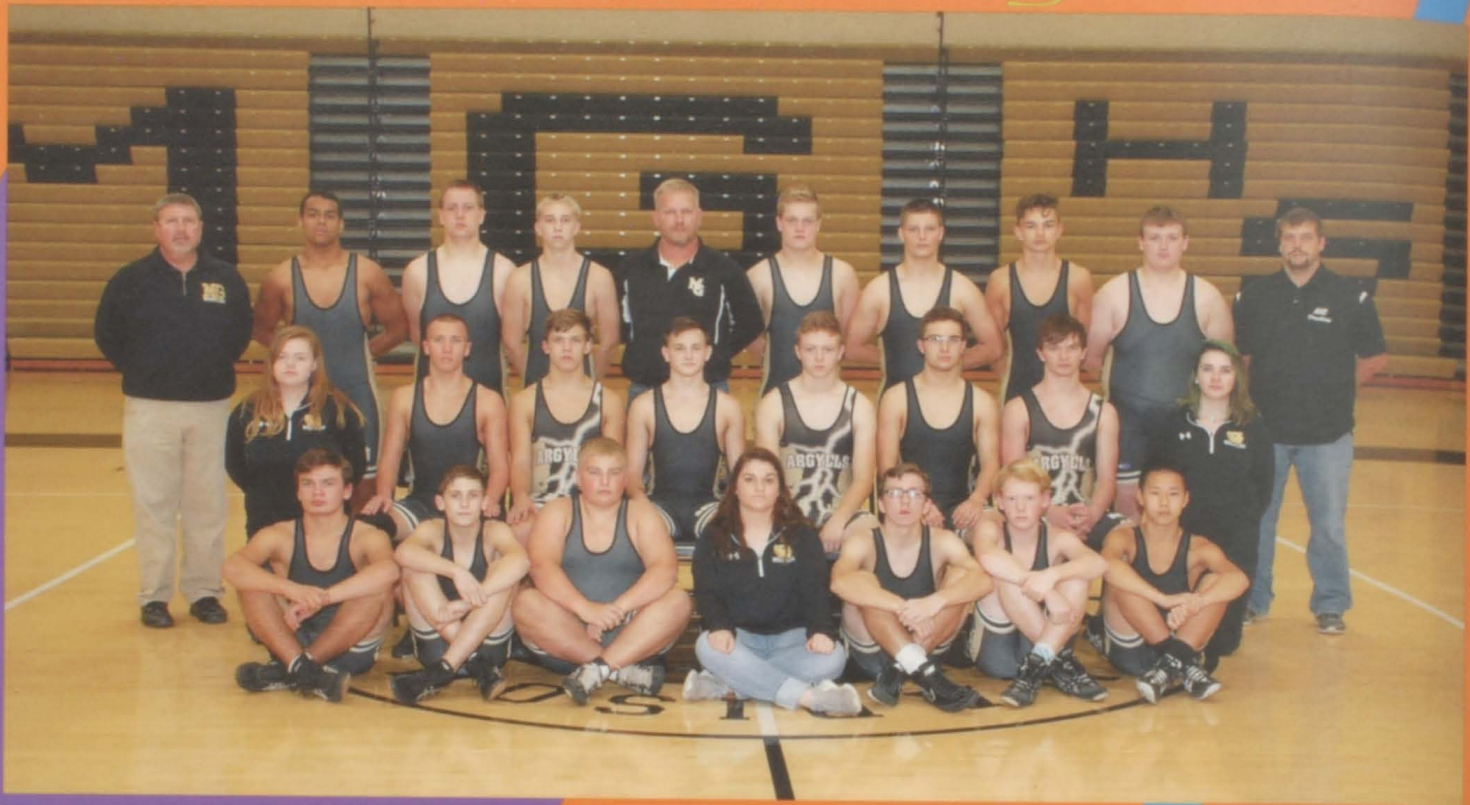

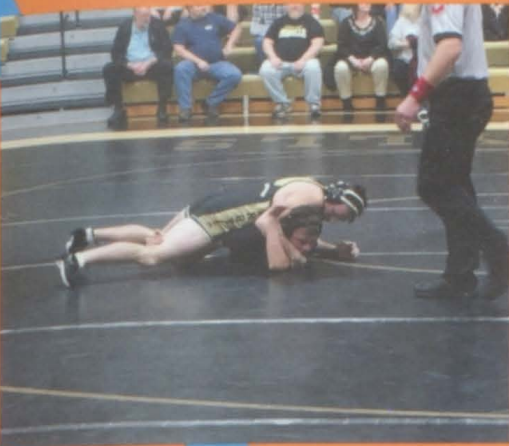

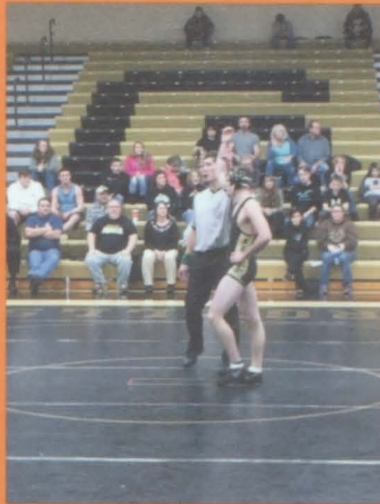

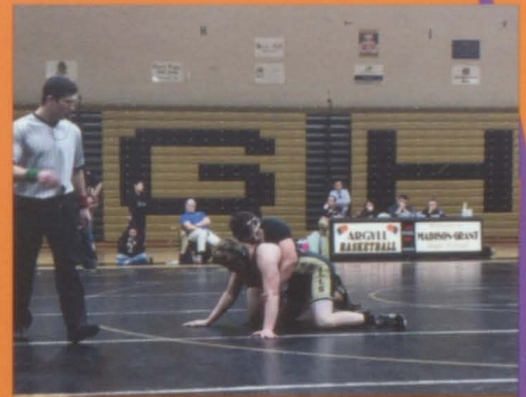

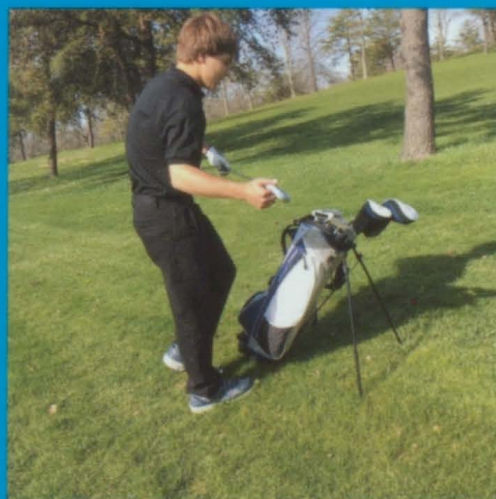

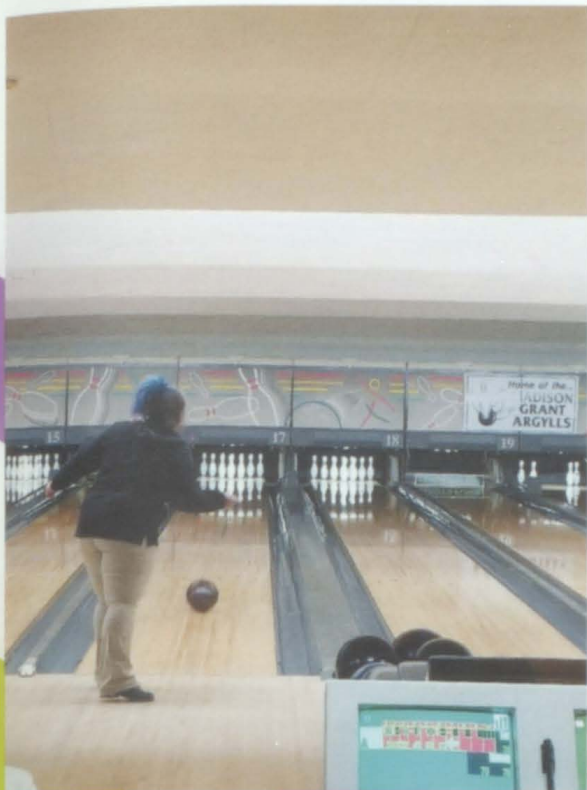

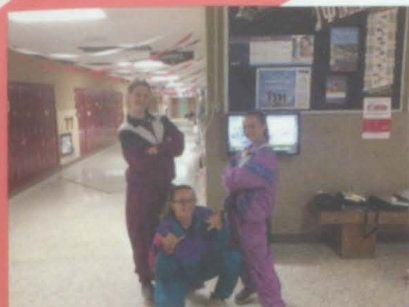

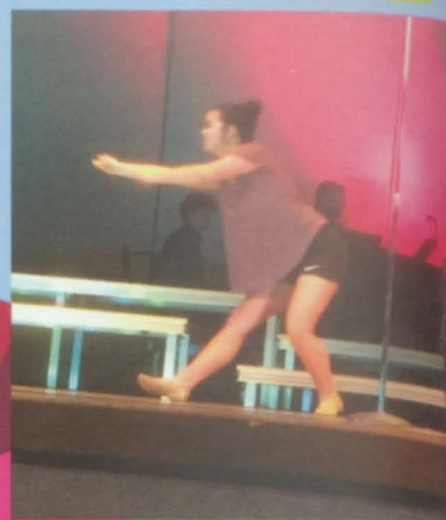

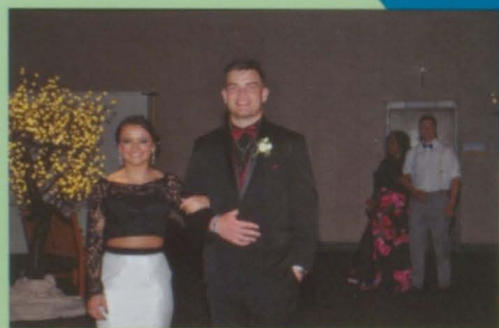

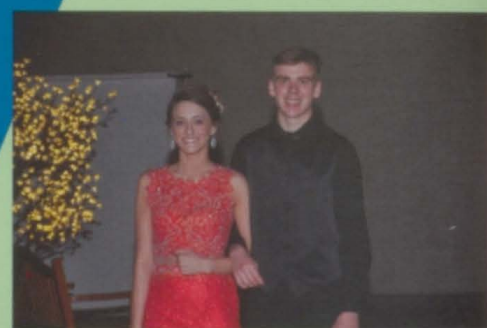

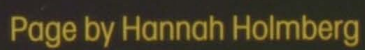

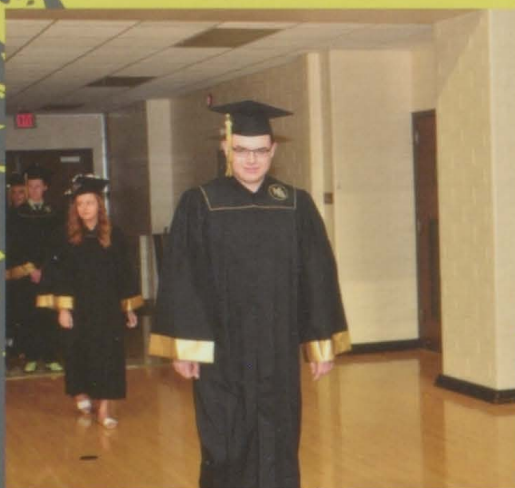

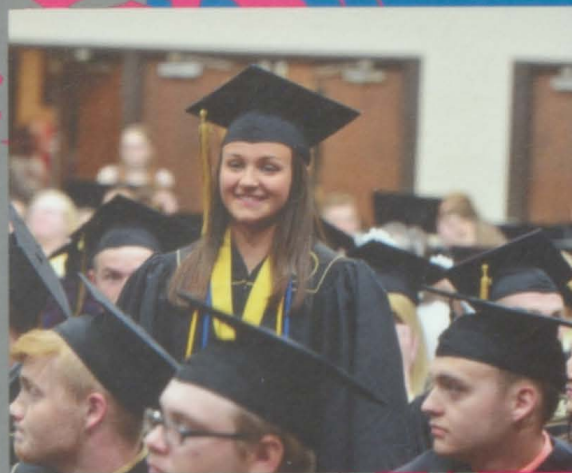

Different by Distinction

As the school year comes to an end at Madison-Grant, many of us look back at all the great things that happened over the year. Many students remember the big things like Homecoming, Prom and Graduation. Others remember the small things like specific teachers helping us succeed or hearing Mr. Mann telling us to "Make it a great day.... Or not. The choice is yours." As annoyed as we were to hear those words every Monday morning, it became a mantra for us to live by. He wanted to make sure we started the week off right and to remind us that we always have a say in how our day, our week, our life goes. Whether it was to help us succeed or help us get through another day, it was real and honest, and that's exactly what we needed to be faced with as we looked ahead to our future lives in the real world. The best part was that we all saw each other making it a great day everyday, and we would help each other have the best day possible. We created a family that looked out for one another because that's what a great day was to us.

Ensuring that we have great days is what makes us so successful, and that success was obvious in the senior class this year. Of the 97 graduates we sent off into the real world, 40 earned Academic Honors Diplomas, 8 earned Technical Honors Diplomas, and 4 earned both an Academic Honors and Technical Honors Diploma. We also had 2 students graduate a year early. 2% of our students will enter the military, including one who will be attending the Naval Academy. 9 students are leaving with various certifications that they can use right now to start a long and successful career. And finally, 79% of our graduates are moving on to either a 2 or 4 year college program where many have already earned credits toward their degree through our dual credit programs. 63 of our graduating seniors earned at least one college credit while in high school, and a total of 1,175 credits were earned saving our students nearly \$200,000 in college tuition. When you add that to the nearly \$2 million earned through grants and scholarships, it's clear that Madison-Grant sets its students up for success, assuming they choose to make it a great life and take advantage of those opportunities. And as the Class of 2018 leaves, the cycle will continue.



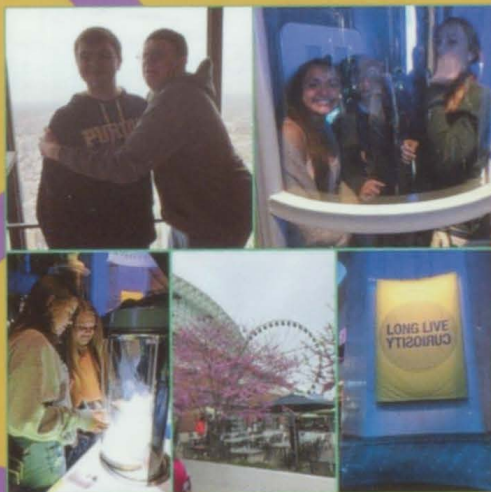

HEALING AFTER HURRICANES



TEXAS AND FLORIDA WERE AMONG THE U.S. STATES HAMPERED BY HURRICANES

MORE THAN 20 TRILLION GALLONS OF RAIN fell across Texas and Louisiana during a 17-day period when Hurricane Harvey made landfall three separate times, the first on Aug. 25. Areas in and around Houston were devastated by the rain. The country came together as 24,000 National Guard troops were deployed and millions of meals and liters of water were donated and distributed. Just two weeks later, Hurricane Irma made landfall in Florida on Sept. 10. Irma was the strongest hurricane recorded in the Atlantic Ocean outside the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean Sea. The massive storm battered the state's lower half and left tornadoes and storm-surge flooding in its path as it went up the Florida peninsula. More than five million people were evacuated along the East Coast.

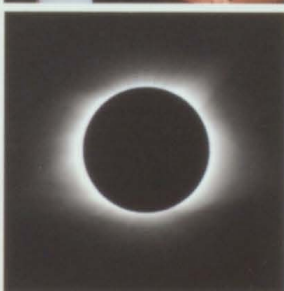

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE HEART



WITH SPECIAL ECLIPSE GLASSES pulled tight to their eyes, families watch the total solar eclipse on Aug. 21. Those viewing in the line of totality experienced a few minutes of dropping temperatures, crickets chirping and streetlights lighting. **BELOW A MISTER IN SHANGHAI, CHINA ON JULY 9**, a man cools off as temperatures skyrocket. NASA and the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration announced the year ranked in the three hottest years on record with land and sea surface temperatures averaging 1.62 degrees Fahrenheit above average. **THE MOON COVERS THE SUN** as the solar eclipse reaches totality. The eclipse was the first to cross the entire United States in 99 years.



DIGGING UP THE PAST

SCIENTISTS ANNOUNCED JAN. 29, the discovery of the fossils of a *Mansourasaurus shahinae* in the Sahara Desert. The fossils revealed the dinosaur was nearly 33 feet long and weighed 5.5 tons.



WE HAVE LIFT-OFF

SPACEX LAUNCHED A ROCKET ON DEC. 23 and sent social media into a frenzy as the exhaust left a strange streak in the sky. The company followed up Feb. 6 with the launch of Falcon Heavy, the most powerful rocket launched in decades. To keep it interesting, Elon Musk packed a Tesla in the rocket.



FIND OF THE JUNGLE

ON FEB. 2, 2018, using Lidar remote sensing technology, archaeologists discovered more than 60,000 Mayan ruins — spread over 810 square miles — hidden under a jungle in Guatemala. This transformed the way scientists viewed and researched the Mayan civilization.

DEVASTATING WILDFIRES

DRIVEN BY SURGING WINDS ON DEC. 4, the unruly blaze was recorded as the third largest in California history and forced mass evacuation as fire and ash overtook cities throughout the state. Firefighters worked to slow the spread of fires as they reached backyards.

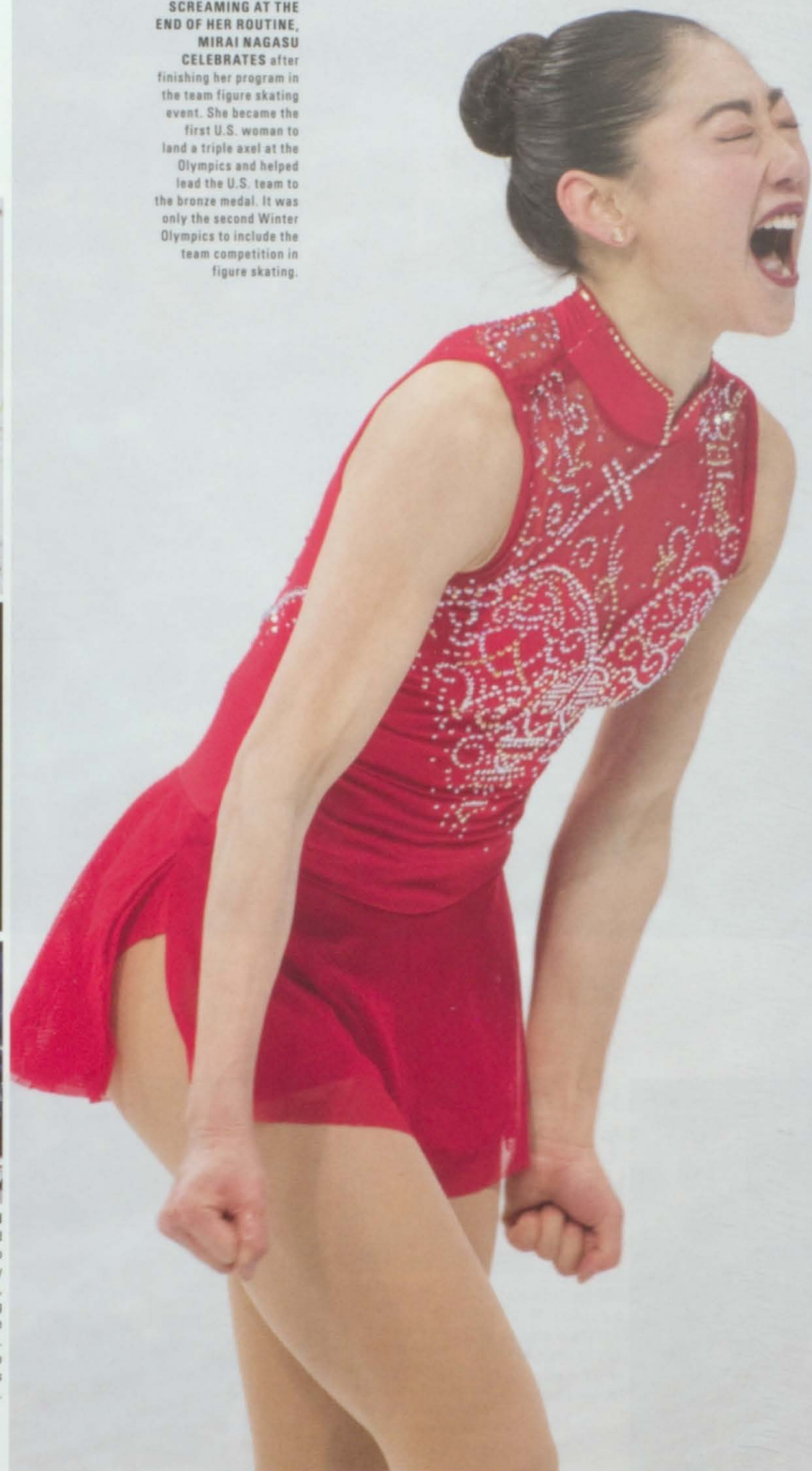

The U.S. women first won gold the year women's hockey was included in the Olympics, in 1998, but hadn't claimed the crown since. Canada defeated the U.S. in all but one of the gold medal matches since, including a heartbreaker in the 2014 Sochi games.
