




We hope to be able to plough through next year, it being our last year in F.H.S., and leave the digging for the juniors that follow.






HAROLD BOWMAN—*Back Guard*


Bowman has been on the varsity this year for the first time. He has plenty of speed and drive, but was unlucky in not making the first five. Bowman is also a senior.





