
is suspected of taking over five hundred dollars of yearbook money.

With combo accompaniment, this organization swings on under the guidance of Rex Jenkins.


Smiling faces and enjoyable songs are to be had

the first of the basketball season. To be admitted each person purchased a Panther pennant.


The Council undertakes a variety of projects for the betterment of our school. They give assistance to the Pep Committee in making signs and slogans to bolster school spirit.



Mr. Ebbert explains the soil testing program to the vocational agriculture students.








