





## Vocational Classes




Pat Fetz, Perry Jarvis, and Dave Wilson repair radio tuners as an electrical project in shop.

Many classes are offered to teach the student a vocation. Shop classes offer a wide variety to choose from. Mr. Johnson gives the boys a sample of working with metal, wood working, electricity, and simple mechanics. A well equipped shop furnishes the needed facilities.

Future farmers in the agriculture classes get practical training in their chosen vocation. They often make field trips to get actual experience in judging soil and livestock.

The varied vocational classes give the student an idea of what a particular line of work is like and attempts to give him some experience.




Many of our boys realizing the advantages of knowing how to type, are enrolled in commercial classes.



Mechanical drawing gives the boys with constructive talents the chance to express themselves.

Health classes give the Freshman and Sophomore students a knowledge of how their function and the proper methods of hygiene. To help demonstrate this, the department has a "take-apart" scale model of the human body with all of the major organs removable. Physical education is taught every other three weeks. These classes take advantage of the outdoor basketball and tennis courts, the track, and softball diamonds so long as weather permits. During the long winter months, the gymnasium is put to full use.

## Health and P.E. Classes



Working closely with the entire athletic department, phy ed boys are often able to get a head start because they have gotten a bit of practice in class.




Setting-up exercises used in field events are learned in phy ed classes.


## Provide Physical Fitness for Frankton Students




Bill Brown gives his students an explanation of the newest piece of equipment in the physics laboratory, a telescope.

# Biologists of the Future Train Here




Modern math taught in the modern manner is a challenge to algebra students taught by Mr. William Brown.

Five years of math may be taken by students in Frankton High School. Two years of algebra with its equations and formulas are offered the students. Plane and solid geometry and analytic geometry challenge many who are further interested, and those who have special interests or math ambitions venture into trig and calculus. General math is offered as an alternate course to ninth grade.

One year of chemistry offered to juniors and seniors introduces students to a possible career in the engineering field. Practically every science course offered in high school or college will require some knowledge of chemistry.

# Classes in Modern and Foreign





## Hi-Y Sponsors Milk for Orphans Project



Following Christmas the boys had an ice-skating party at Boca-Ree-Al and later adjourned to the home of their sponsor for pizza and cokes.




















## Personalities Make
