





Experiencing both elation and disaster, the fifteen members of the journalism staff spent many hours preparing the 1967 WHIRLWIND.

Work began in the spring of 1966 with each editor of a section working with Cathy McManaman, editor, to lay out the dummy. Many long hours were spent by the staff during the summer, after school, on week-ends, and in class, too, in order to meet the deadlines. Even when snow caused school to be closed, a few of the staff members couldn't stay away. They spent the entire day cropping pictures, drawing layouts, and writing copy.

The journalism staff also published the BREEZE, a weekly paper. Charla Compton, editor, headed the BREEZE staff. The students tried several new ideas including new columns and cartoons, but retained much of the old.


Nine new members were inducted into Quill and Scroll, a national honorary organization for journalism students, in 1967. All the members had to maintain an A or B average and be in the upper one-third of the class. They had to have shown outstanding ability in some phase of journalism and have been recommended by the teacher or sponsor.

The new members each received a pin and a one-year subscription to QUILL AND SCROLL magazine, compliments of the Society.

Some of the main functions of the "66-67" Student Council were organizing Homecoming, revising the Student Handbook and conducting the magazine sales.











Everyone danced until the magic hour of twelve to the music of "Thee Cinders."



The boys pictured earned their jackets for their efforts in either baseball or football. Several more boys were awarded jackets last spring for the participation in winter and spring sports.






FHS Bowling League offered an intramural sport for boys and girls not active in inter-school winter sports.



The team placed second in the MIC, second in the County Meet, and third in the Oak Hill Relays.



Another highlight of the junior year was the induction of members into the National Honor Society. Eleven juniors received this honor.



Freshmen struggled to complete biology leaf collections and to solve algebra


problems. They searched for information for future occupations.
