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
Our Progress in Learning Provided Us





Varied Programs and Activities Provided



Around the World













Since the beginning of time, man has manipulated with numbers, trying in his mind to fathom the complicated and exact science of mathematics.


Mr. Donald Brown is the head of the mathematics department. This year, under his direction, two top seniors, Barb Knauer and Gerry Buttler, attended a contest at Franklin College in which over 30 top schools from around the state participated. Gerry took top honors with fourth, and Barb also placed very high. (This is only one example of the opportunities concerning mathematics in our school.)

To gain the general fundamentals of math, a student can take general mathematics, which is taught by Mr. Stafford. Anyone on the academic course begins his training under the direction of Mr. Mercer, in algebra. The sophomore geometry class is taught by Mr. Harbron, Mr. Smith, and Mr. Brown. Mr. Harbron is the junior algebra instructor. Senior math, taught by Mr. Brown, offers students advanced courses in solid geometry, trigonometry, analytic geometry, and calculus.




Peggy Weismiller demonstrates the use of the compass to Debby Clouser, Tim Leathers, and Debbie Wittkamper in geometry class.



The Study of Foreign Languages




Carmen Garcia gives a discussion on clothing in Spanish class.




of Past Events and Governmental Processes







Through careful planning and reliable criticisms, the students of Willkie High continued to pursue their individual talents in art.




Varied Clerical Courses Augmented

Business Education is concerned with two major aspects of the education of youth: (1) the knowledge, attitudes, and nonvocational skills needed by all persons to be effective in their personal economics and in their understanding of our economic system, and (2) the vocational knowledge and skills needed for initial employment and for advancement in a business career.

The fast-moving pace of our society has brought a new sense of urgency in the training of business education students. Students are provided with a choice of three business programs: general business, secretarial, and general clerical. By giving students the choice of completing one of the three programs, or two of the three programs, a diversified type of program is developed to take care of the needs and interests of the students. Our two intensive business laboratories train senior students for gainful and immediate employment as general clerical workers, or as stenographers.

There were six vocational programs offered in Elwood Public Schools. They were: Machine Shop, Building and Trades, Home Economics, DCE, VCT, and VOT. A full summer program was offered in DCE and Vocational Machine Shop.

The vocational machine shop program was a two-year program for juniors and seniors interested in becoming machinists or toolmakers. The building and trades class was a similar program. This year the class made a candy cane house for the Chamber of Commerce to be used as the Santa headquarters, made new incinerators for the elementary schools, and built shelves for the band room.

The primary purposes of vocational homemaking were those concerned with assisting the student to determine worthwhile values for immediate personal and home living.

The students enrolled in the VOT program were in class all morning and pursued their studies in shorthand, transcribing, typing and letter writing.

The VCT program, which was also a half-day program was taught in the same vocational laboratory, trained for occupations of a clerical nature.





The Industrial Arts Department is one of the most diversified and progressing programs in our high school. It provides students with the newest knowledge and equipment available, and enforces the strictest safety measures to insure the maximum of industrial opportunities.

The experience gained in high school prepares students for extended study in college or for practical use upon graduation.

In recent years blue-print reading, welding, small engines, electronics, home repairs, and home mechanics for girls have been added to this curriculum. There is also a full summer program in Diversified Cooperative Education and Vocational Machine Shop.

The Elwood City School has planned and broken ground for a new area Vocational School, which will be in operation approximately a year from now. When this new building is completed, the Vocational and Adult Programs are expected to expand two or three times their present enrollment.






A student in debate not only learns about the matter discussed, but after being in debate is able to make speeches more easily, get up in front of groups to talk, and organize his time and materials.


New Math Club Joined WHS Organizations

Guest speakers were another highlight of this club.



Candy Carter demonstrates the proper use of the abacus, an ancient mathematical instrument, to the members of the Math Club.














Spirit Throughout a Rough Season









Officers of the FCA were: Barney Alexander, president; Chris Juday, vice-president; and Barry Juday, secretary-treasurer.


EHS Saw a Potpourri of Sectional Thrills




Freshman Rick Coston, the first Elwood wrestler to win a sectional title, proudly displays his ribbon with Coach Mitschelen.




Senior Barry Juday, as King Red and Blue, gives a stirring pep talk to the student body during the Sectional pep session.
