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## Drugs don't make it

IDFY, which stands for International Drug Free Youth, is a new program created by Community Hospital and the Chemical People Task Force. "This program was not set up to catch kids, but to award them for being drug free," according to Dave Chilcote, coordinator.

To join, a student must provide a urine sample which was tested at Community Hospital. If the test was negative, then the student received their own membership card, entitling them to discount at stores and restaurants. Another benefit of having an IDFY card is that you get free admission to all dances. All you have to do is show the admission workers your card and walk on in. The group sponsoring the dance keeps track of the free admission count and then they get reimbursed by the school.




end up with a good record at the end of the season. After the Homecoming game, the team left the field with a 7 - 0 record.



# Making The Moves





# Making *Their* Mark







Much change took place with the 1993-94 FJSHS faculty. These changes ranged from a new assistant principal to a teaching assistant.



This year the Peer Helpers went to their annual retreat at Bradford Woods, where they learned many different skills such as: how to cooperate with people, and how to trust them.


The group gave presentations about dealing with drinking and driving.



Along with all the other activities the student council organizes like dances, custodian, teacher, cafeteria appreciation days, and the leadership conference, there were two new ones.





Brian Culp, Eagle's Wings editor-in-chief, decided what news was worthy to be printed.





As you drive through Frankton, or walk down the halls of the school, at some point in time you will hear or see the band and guard perform.


In the summer the band and guard did fundraisers to help put together their show, like selling concessions at Raceway Park, carwashes, and selling calendars.




One of their first activities was visiting Huntington College to see the students perform "Joseph and The Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat".



This year turned out to be an eventful one for the Honor Society. They were involved in initiations, a dinner, coat checks, and a program called Quarters for Kids.




# Speaking the Language



With the Technical Preparation program going into effect next year, the Industrial Technology program will become even bigger and even more computerized.







MVP awards were given out for both teams. For the boys, Brandon Sanders received the award. Christen O'Neil received the MVP for the girls team.







# Practice Makes Perfect

When sectional came around, the Eagles were ranked #3 in class 2A. After thumping Winchester, the Eagles were upset in the 2nd round for the first time in 5 years.


Despite the loss, senior



Receiving awards for the seventh graders were Angie Goodpaster, the Most Improved Player, and Holli Mehling, who received the Sportsmanship Award.












The Eagle wrestling team





Junior Ryan Andis said, "Even though I didn't play as good as I wanted, the team is a lot better than I thought it would be."





The annual event was well-attended and after two acts and an intermission the audience was dismissed.





Perfect Attendance, and Medals of Achievement for EBS.








