

One of the many duties of hall monitors, is raising the flag each morning. First period monitors Brenda Hutcheson, and Jan Heniser, enjoy the early morning task.






F.H.S. Pep Club shows feelings of joy, unbelief, and determination as the Eagles rolled over the Scots, 93--67, during the Homecoming game.


Reverence, Patriotism and Loyalty . . .








Students learned basic skills in the Social Sciences, languages, math and science, and vocational subjects that will aid them as future citizens in our complicated society.

Studying Math and Science in Our World






Better Communication Is the Goal of



Native dances were enjoyed by Girl's P.E. Classes. Here the 3rd period Sophomores better their co-ordination, as they enjoy the dances.












Many F.H.S. Students were on the Business Course during the 1968-69 school year. The courses offered included Typing I and II, shorthand, Business English, Business Math and General Business.


The Social Sciences Breed Understanding






This year's drum major was Randy Thomas and the head majorette was Sheela Whitten.



Cross Country Team Captures Unexpected




You have to give credit to these boys as some of them are strictly basketball players and come out to help the team out and did a very commendable job.















